

Managers Comments by Matt Haggerty

Be sure to read my comments this month and next to stay informed about a future rate change for the cooperative. This is the final month in the series about factors that will cause a rate increase in the future. This month we will review inflation and its effects on the cost of materials and software.

EFFECTS OF INFLATION

Our last rate increase was in 2012 and next month, in my column, I will be announcing the future rate change for the cooperative. This month in our threemonth series about factors that will cause a rate increase in the future, we will review inflation and its effects on the cost of materials and software.

Inflation is something we all feel the effects of in our daily lives. We can all identify items that have gone up significantly in cost in the last few years. In fact, I think it would be hard to think of an item that costs the

same now as it did three years ago or even last year. Park Electric has been absorbing these cost increases on the materials and supplies we need to operate. Unfortunately, the increase in material cost is not an area we have any control over.

Let's look at the following examples:

• Our cost to buy new transformers has increased by 300% in the last three years. In 2020, they cost us \$219,769, in 2021, they cost \$417,794, and in 2022, they cost \$895,845.

(We did have to purchase a slightly higher number of transformers each year from 2020-22 due to our rapid growth, but the pricing is set by the distributor.)

• In other material costs, which include poles, cross arms, insulators, and wire, we purchased \$601,514 in 2020, \$1,118,714 in 2021, and \$1,264,762 in 2022.

(Again, we did see more growth in 2021 and 2022 which required us to buy slightly more materials than in 2020, but the majority of this cost is due to increased cost per item.)

• We have also seen a price increase of 5-15% on

our software needed to meter and bill our membership.

As you can see, many of the goods and services required to keep the electricity flowing have seen a sharp increase in cost over the last few years. While we do everything to keep our costs low, increased prices from our vendors have made everything more expensive. These changes increase the cost of our duty to serve our membership,

repair outages, install new services, and complete system upgrades to accommodate growth. We have reached the point where we can no longer absorb these costs. If we do not implement a rate increase our costs to operate will soon be higher than the revenue we collect from our members.

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
